

Good morning Borneo!

You are fast asleep in your hammock in the tall green dense jungle when suddenly your radio alarm clock rings: The DJ yells, "Good morning Borneo! This is Radio Kalaweit. The news headlines; another three gibbons have been rescued..." Believe it or not this radio station in Indonesia actually exists! Playing vibrant pop music Radio Kalaweit broadcasts from a gibbon sanctuary deep in the Borneo jungle in Kalimantan Tengah. Kalaweit in the local language means gibbon. The station has been given the nickname *Radio Gibbon* - largely thanks to Frenchman, Chanee Brule, 29, who broadcasts part-time as a DJ on the radio station. His job is rather special. He is actually a conservationist who runs the gibbon sanctuary. His job helps save the lives of gibbons and re-introduces them to the forests of South-East Asia.

The Frenchman broadcasts on the radio station to help educate young people in the region about ape conservation. As a result he receives a significant number of tip-offs about gibbons that have been abandoned by their owners or are being illegally held as pets. It is all rather unconventional yet his broadcasts work. Some have even been rescued 30 minutes after their discovery. The result is the station is now the most listened to in Borneo. Certainly all this does put a whole new meaning into the term 'funky gibbon'!**

The radio broadcasts are only a part of his work. Even more fascinating is the Frenchman runs a dating agency – for gibbons. The idea here is to get a male and female together and get them to mate. Brule and his team rescue these apes, caring for them at the sanctuary. But that is only the start of the work. Rehabilitated gibbons cannot be returned alone to the wild, as they will be attacked by other pairs defending their territory. So Brule attempts to pair up gibbons at the sanctuary, by match-making rescued apes.

Brule: "You can't put one male and one female in one cage and know for sure it will be a good pair. In particular one gibbon tends to dominate within each pair, and the dominant partner can be either male or female." He adds, "If both gibbons don't want to be dominated they will fight until one

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dies." So Brule attempts partnerships between a more dominant and less dominant character. These pairs are then released into the forest together.

The Frenchman fell in love with gibbons after seeing them in a zoo as a child. He studied apes from a young age, producing a guide to their captive care aged 13. The guide that is still used today won him some funding to look at gibbons in the wild. He later received donations from famous film stars like Brigitte Bardot, which he used to set up the sanctuary in Borneo called Kalimantan. Today the sanctuary is mostly populated by gibbons with cute baby gibbons raised there.

Gibbons are among the most endangered of all apes, living in tropical and sub-tropical forest in and around China and India, including the islands of Borneo, Sumatra and Java. They belong to the lesser family of apes, and are tree-dwelling. The great apes include gorillas, chimps and orangutans. Brule: "Gibbons, the elusive singing apes of South-East Asia. At dawn, their magical love songs herald the start of each new day. Now, in Borneo, their songs are falling silent as their forest home is destroyed."

The apes are threatened by the loss of their natural habitat caused by deforestation. Vast areas have been cleared to make way for palm oil plantations. The biodiversity of the area is under serious threat, with six million hectares being lost. By 2015, this area will double. Many gibbons have also disappeared because of poaching, with the animals being stolen for the pet trade. Wild gibbons are the fastest and most agile of all the apes swinging distances of up to 15 meters between branches and travelling at speeds of 56km/h.

EXERCISES

1. **Borneo:** Think of three things you know about Borneo. Go round the room swapping details.
