Great Britain is made up of England, Scotland and Wales. Great Britain and Northern Ireland make up the United Kingdom. The British Isles are made up of the above but also include Ireland (not a part of GB or the UK), the Channel Islands (Jersey, Guernsey, etc.) and the Isle of Man.

England can be divided into various regions, like the East of England, the South East, the South West, the West and East Midlands. There is also the North East, the North West, as well as Yorkshire and Humberside. The UK is split into 48 ceremonial counties, for example Essex, Hertfordshire, and Lancashire.

Well known cities include Edinburgh and Glasgow in Scotland; Manchester, Liverpool, Leeds and Newcastle in the north. In the Midlands you will find Birmingham, Nottingham, Leicester and Coventry. In the West of England there is Bristol and Bath. Cardiff and Swansea are in Wales, while in Northern Ireland there is Belfast.

Famous rivers in England include the river Thames in London and the river Trent in Nottingham. The river Severn and the river Avon are both in the West of England. The UK has many canals. These include the Grand Union Canal, the Kennet and Avon canal and the Leeds and Liverpool canal.

In Scotland you will find the Highlands and Ben Nevis. Around Scotland there are the Outer Hebrides, the Orkney Islands and the Shetland Islands. **Continued on page 2...**

THE ARTICLE - CONTINUED

The Cambrian Mountains, the Brecon Beacons and the Clwydian Hills are located in Wales. In Northern Ireland you will see Giant's Causeway. These are some very interesting shaped rocks.

The Pennines are in the North of England. These small mountains form 'the backbone of England' and separate the North East from the North West. Nearby is the Peak District, as are the North Yorkshire Moors. The beautiful Lake District is located in the North West of England.

The Fens and the Norfolk Broads are both in the East of England. The former are flatlands, the latter an inland waterway. Another interesting area to see is the Cotswolds. These beautiful rolling hills are found to the north and west of London.

In the South West of England you will find Dartmoor, Exmoor and Bodmin Moor. There is also the wonderful Mendip Hills to explore. Just off the tip of Cornwall (a county) are the Isles of Scilly.

In the South East of England are the North and South Downs, in the middle of which is The Weald. In the South of England is the Isle of Wight.

The UK is surrounded mostly by sea. This includes: the North Sea, the English Channel, the Irish Sea, the Celtic Sea, St Georges Channel, the Atlantic Ocean, and the Bristol Channel.

Running north south and through London is the famous Meridian Line that passes through Greenwich, hence Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

Other interesting things to see include the Channel Tunnel, Hadrian's Wall and Stonehenge.
